Calling all marketgoers!

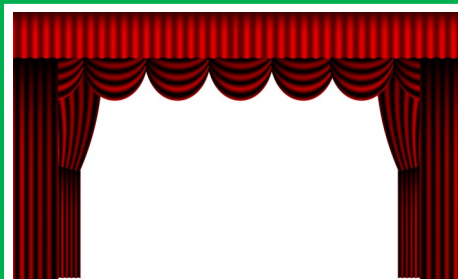

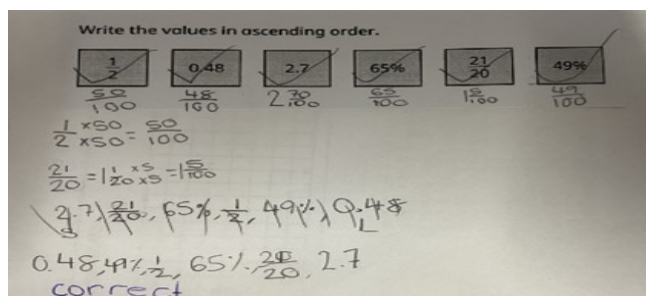

Year 6 News

Mathematics

During our maths lessons we have been looking at fractions, decimals and percentages. We have used this stem sentence help us convert the between the three.

In order to convert a percentage to a fraction, first convert it to a fraction with a denominator of 100.



We always start our maths learning off with what we notice.

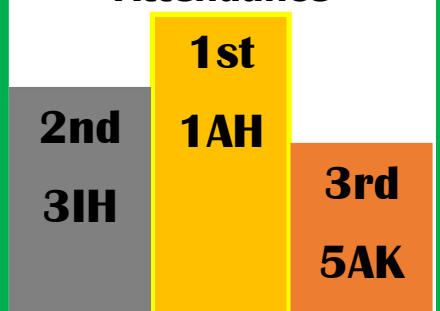


Rainbow Star of the Week

Attendance



Attendance Matters

The school has a duty to communicate clearly about the attendance of pupils and the importance of good attendance (equal to or greater than 96%). This week every pupil will have received an attendance letter. Pupils who attend school regularly achieve well and those who do not attend regularly achieve lower attainment grades and make less progress. This is evident in both school and National data. Pupils who fall below 90% attendance are classed as 'persistently absent' and school is required to report this to the Local Authority. We are also required to take action to improve the attendance of those who are persistently absent by meeting regularly with parents and offering support.

Good attendance means being in school at least 96% of the time, which is at least 182 – 190 days a year. 175 days a year are NOT spent in school!



Did you know?

- Being absent for a day of school each week is equivalent to missing 2 Years of their school life.
- A two-week holiday in term time means that the highest attendance a child can achieve is 94.7%.
- If you can improve your attendance by 1% you will see a 5% improvement in achievement.
